TV/TECH MINISTRY

TV Ministry looks forward to serving and providing technical support for the church in 2024. We will investigate replacement of the rear projector used by the worship leaders. While working well, the projector is aging. When it fails, it will be difficult and expensive to service. An appropriately-sized LCD screen- such as the two in the front of the sanctuary and the one in rear overflow section- will provide a better image, be more reliable, run more efficiently, and be compatible with the three current screens.

We also will evaluate the Youth & Young Adult Intern Program, review its effectiveness, determine if it should be extended, and- if so- for how long, and what new funding would be needed. The young peoples' involvement has been critical in providing reliable, capable tech support in the sanctuary and when Livestreaming. We appreciate the United Women in Faith giving a Christmas gift to each of the young people. They appreciated it.

The Tech Team also thanks Pastor Michelle for taking time during the December 10 service to recognize its contributions. Tech Team members like to "labor in obscurity," but it still is important to be acknowledged.

As always, we thank the Shalom Fund, the Board of Trustees, and the congregation members and friends who, in financial support and in prayer, undergird this outreach and support ministry of Central Church. -Mark Marino

We have some exciting news to share! Central UMC has been selected to be a "Neighborhood Mission Hub" for the Binghamton region. We will be the first point of contact for disaster needs in our area. We will be accepting flood buckets, health kits, and menstrual kits from the Upper New York office in January 2024. They will be stored in the Mission Room in the basement. In addition to those, we will be helping to organize the mission programs in the area, working on Asset Based Community Development, and creating "new" mission kits unique to our area.

Our mini-mission projects for January will be collecting packages of Valentine cards for the U-E elementary schools. In February we will celebrate "Souper-bowl Sunday" with a collection of canned soups and money to support CHOW and Shepherd's Supper. -Pastor Paul

FINANCIAL UPDATE

There's vitality and energy at Central, as well as an amazing congregation committed to supporting Central with their gifts of time, talents and finances. While it's too soon to know how Central finished the year financially, we do know that thanks to all of our commitments to Christian stewardship and financial generosity, Central will finish 2023 with a positive balance.

What makes this even more noteworthy is that in the middle of 2023 Central conducted a significant Capital Campaign. You've already seen results with new roof, parking lot and entrance doors. So, in addition to supporting the ministries, programs and missions of Central in 2023 the congregation committed an additional \$212,000 for 5 years and have already given over \$100,000. This is an amazing feat. It's so wonderful to report on the finances in such a positive way. That's thanks to the giving of all of us.

As we enter 2024, we begin the way we have for many years. There's a significant gap between the committed giving from the recent pledge drive and the budget. This is nothing new, and past history has proven to us that we can enter the year with faith that the gap will close during the year and we will finish the year positively.

Knowing that the Central congregation will

About five years ago we began discussions about the need to have a 501c(3) non-profit organization that would support Central but not be Central. We recognized that there are opportunities for grants that are not provided to religious organizations, even if it's for similar activities. Three years ago we began working to obtain full 501c(3) status.

Central Serves' mission is to provide community support and guidance to the greater Endicott area through service and education. Central Serves also supports the community outreach and missions of Central Church. Central Serves has already received 2 grants, both of which have supported Central Church. A \$1,000 grant was received in early 2023. Central Serves gave \$500 of this to the Trustees for refurbishment of the flood damage in the Education building, with the expectation that Central will eventually use the building for outreach to the community. The other \$500 was donated to Shepherd's Supper. This past summer, with your voting support, Central Serves was awarded a \$2,000 grant from Adam Weitsman and Southern Tier Tuesdays. The awarded funding was used to completely refurbish the kitchen pantry.

Central Serves is currently working with Central missions on the Bike project. We

support Jennie F Snapp with an attendance incentive program and supported the U-E teachers with the purchase of new equipment.

Currently the Central Serves Board of Directors include: Knud Hansen, President; Denise Johnson, Secretary/Treasurer. Paul Reed and Alicia Thoennes are board members. We are in

need of a Vice President. Please let any of the members know if you are interested in filling that position or joining the Board. Central Serves is always looking for donations to support existing and future projects.

SHEPHERD'S SUPPER PANTRY PROJECT



Thanks to a team effort, a much-needed face lift was provided for our pantry! Shepherd's Supper volunteers identified the need, and an application was submitted to Southern Tier Tuesday grant by Central Serves 501 (3) (c). It was awarded due to the many people who voted for our nomination. Thank you for voting! A special thanks is extended to Adam Weitsman for his generous funding of the Southern Tier Tuesdays program and Central's \$2,000 grant award!

The work began with choosing, ordering and picking up materials, emptying the pantry, dismantling and removing the old shelving, cleaning, prepping, painting, installing the new lighting, drop ceiling and new shelving, and then refilling the pantry! Thank you to volunteers who provided approximately 75 – 80 hours of labor for the project including Doug & Pat Breneman, Charlie Brinser, Art Felton, Knud Hansen, Denise Johnson and Gregg Wood. Expenses did exceed the grant award by \$400 and we thank Central Church's Trustees for the additional financial support.

The renovated pantry has received very positive reviews. Nicole Derick, current volunteer cook, stated, "The renovation of the pantry has been a game changer! Being able to house food staples in a clean, well-lit space allows the Shepherd Supper team to assess what can be used, or still needed for dinners. We are more efficient this way. It is a cook's dream pantry!" Martha Webber agreed, "It makes meal planning much easier!" Art Felton stated, "It is a lot more convenient and organized. You can see what is in there now." Sharon Carmine, previous volunteer agreed, "It's absolutely gorgeous. The layout of the shelving, is neat, efficient, has much better lighting and is cheerful. I'm not afraid to go in there now. It's worth a peek for everyone."

This project is an example of how Central Serves and Central Church connect and serve together!

From Shepherd's Supper:

Shepherd's Supper has had an amazing year. Through the second week of December we have served 9,878 meals. For the entire year of 2022, 8218 meals were served, so we have experienced an increase of 2000 meals, a 26% increase. This is due to the excellent teams we have preparing and serving the meals. Through the midpoint of December we've received 1,860 volunteer hours. Thanks to the generosity of the Central congregation, \$4,625 has been donated as well as many pounds of food items during our Harvest Home food offering. While Shepherd's Supper is in the Central budget, it does not cover all the expenditures we've had this year, so all donations are appreciated.

Additionally, huge thanks to our friends from Our Lady of Good Counsel. especially to Teena and Bob Cargill. Teena is the cook for Week 3. Bob and the confirmation youth are always present to help on weeks 3 and 4. We wouldn't be able to do this without their support.
