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### PASTOR MICHELLE'S **NOTES**

Friends, I have been immersed in the world of homiletics (preaching) this week (May 15-18). There is probably a baptismal pun in there, and it probably fits, if I'm honest. I have to say, however, that the Festival of Homiletics in Minneapolis has provided streams of the living water of soul refreshment to me. I attended this Festival several times years ago, but in the intervening years have managed to convince myself that I am too busy or too short on time to go. That was a mistake.

You may not know that the preaching world has its rock stars, but it does, and some of them have been here this week. I was able to hear the Most Reverend Michael Curry, the Archbishop of the Episcopal Church in the US, and the Rev Otis Moss III, and Bishop Yvette Flunder and the Rev. Matt Skinner and the Rev. Shannon Kershner and Dr. MaryAnn McKibben Dana, the Rev Jonathan Merrit, and Dr. Anna Carter Florence. I swam in the wisdom of these folks as they preached and lectured, and finally, I tried to keep my breath as Dr. Amy-Jill Levine whizzed through an amazing admonition to preachers to quit beating up on Judaism.

Hearing different voices from a range of traditions stirs up the preacher's spirit. We too often get stuck in our own experience and the experience of our own congregations that we stop listening outside that circle. Listening to the expert wordsmithing and crafting of phrases to communicate the gospel convinces everyone who attends (or most of us, anyway) that we could and should preach better than we do—and we all go home resolved to try, each taking our own spark of inspiration to ignite our congregations.

Talking about faith, and Jesus, and God is one of the marks of the Christian life. As United Methodists who become members of a local church, we promise to commit ourselves to the work of the church with our prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness. I am so excited that we will hear twelve folks make that promise this month.

As I muse on words and witness and preaching and faith, I am struck by that last one, witness, because this is what preaching boils down to: The willingness to tell people what we know about our life in God and what is possible because of it. The truth that makes people nervous is that telling it is not just up to the preachers in the crowd. The good news is that ultimately, our witness doesn't have to be carefully crafted or perfectly phrased; our witness is the way we speak and live what we believe, and the ways we are willing to acknowledge the work of God in our lives and name the things of God when we see them, even out loud.

I hope that together, we create effective and magnetic ways of speaking that truth to our congregation, our community, and beyond, and if necessary, with words.

# PASTOR PAUL'S NOTES

"A stone which the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone." (Psalm 118:22) Psalm 118 is one of the final prayer songs of the Passover Feast; the author of the Psalm is referencing Israel as the "rejected cornerstone" and God made sure that they were put into a place of importance. New Testament scholars point to Jesus as the cornerstone that was rejected, and then elevated to the position of cornerstone by God.

The cornerstone is traditionally the first stone laid down by builders when they are creating a new building. It is usually one of the largest and most solid stones, carefully selected for this important role. This stone geographically orients the building and all other stones are laid down based on this one. The importance of Jesus as "the cornerstone" is that we are to look to Jesus for our orientation and guidance and to be sure that we are lined up with that.

In hiking, cairns serve a similar process. They are piles of rocks (sometimes small or sometimes large) that mark trails when traditional trail markers cannot be used. Traditional trail markers include paint marks on trees or plastic disks nailed onto trees. As well as marking the main trail, these cairns are important as they may indicate turns to side trails, location of water sources, locations of shelter, or other safety features. I have relied while in the Catskills and they pointed to interesting outcroppings and spectacular views.

1 Peter 2:5 says, "You also are living stones, being used to build up a spiritual foundation." I see us as those cairns— marking the trail to Christ, indicating where someone can find shelter, guiding the lost, helping the hungry find food, bringing people to water and life. We have an important job as these "living stones"!

The past few months, Central Serves has continued to refine its focus: education and support for children and families in Greater Endicott. That's meant working with schools, teachers, administrative staff and more in our immediate radius. We've met with the principal of CFJ Elementary, the Community Schools Coordinator of Jennie F Snapp, and the Family Support Center Coordinator. It's been quite a winter and spring!

Plus, we've added three board members: Alicia Thoennes, Shelia Carpenter, and Denise Johnson. That means the board size has DOUBLED in the past six months! That's great news!

So when a new proposal came across our desks to support mental health for local students this past month, we were excited to explore it more. Mental health for students directly connects to our mission and focus, and is such a big issue.

Have you heard of #HashtagHOPE? It's run by our very own Karen Bixby, Central's Administrative Assistant, and features pictures of local high school students with uplifting messages about suicide prevention.

Karen came to us with a simple request: t-shirts for the next batch of students who will be featured in the social media posts. Her goal is simple: use pictures of youth that their peers will recognize, and post them with meaningful messages.

We looked at our budget (currently funded by bottle and can money, keep bringing in your cans!), and realized that we had enough to pay for the t-shirts. She's been paying for the whole #HashtagHOPE program out of pocket, and that was the least we could do! 





# COMMUNITY CONNECTION: IT'S UP TO YOU!

During my time as Associate Pastor, one of my favorite things was bragging about Central to community groups, and encouraging them to apply for things like the Allocations Grant. Another one of my favorite things was tabling and getting to meet community members at events, and meeting community leaders.

So when I left my post to go work at Binghamton University, I was really grateful that Pastor Michelle gave me the space to still be something we called the "Community Coordinator," who continued to do those things. However, it's time for me to take a step back - and I have full faith that Central will continue to grow into a force for good in the community!

Here's an example of how easy community outreach can be. Just three weeks ago, I got to go to the American Civic Association because there was a volunteer project there from my full-time job at Binghamton University. Finding myself at a new organization, I asked a lot of questions and learned how they're rebooting their Refugee Resettlement program and in need of both funds and material donations.

That's when I started talking about Central. I told her I'd send her a copy of the Allocations application when it opens in July (for the September deadline). I told her I'd mention it to Missions and Pastor Paul. I invited her to come see the Clothing Center, so she could get the refugees clothing (instead of trying to store all different sizes and seasons, let us help!). I bragged hard, friends, about how mission-oriented we are.

I didn't promise anything except sharing the message of what they're doing to my friends at Central, and then connected them to existing programs at the church. I didn't volunteer any of us for more work than we have. I just shared that Central loves the community and is already doing so much... and to bring them into our space to meet people like Amy in the Clothing Center.

An update: As of this article, the ACA staff did come to the church! And met Amy, and Pastor Paul, and Alicia from Missions. What an amazing moment.

Running into community leaders and sharing the story of Central's ministries and missions... That's basically what I've been doing for two years - and now it's your turn!

Wherever you go, share the story of what Central does for the community, and offer to help them access those resources! Share the Allocations application in July! Offer to introduce them to Amy, or to Karen in the office, or offer to connect them with Pastor Paul! This is how outreach and community connection work.

I'm stepping down as the official "Community Coordinator" because it's your turn. You can do this, friends. You can spread the word wherever you go about what Central does for the community. Start small - don't worry about starting with a straight-up Sunday morning church invite. Let us build rapport with people, organizations, schools and more. Let us show who we are, and let God work on peoples' hearts.

Be proud of who you are, and what you do in the community. It's God's work to build a stronger community, and everyone is going to want to be a part. There's so much abundance at Central that we don't always see, but other organizations could really benefit from. Share God's bounty, build a bigger table, all that - that's evangelism, and community connection.

Keep going, and keep growing, friends. It's your turn.

Even though you will walk through some difficult times and places where it seems as if there is nothing but darkness – as if even death is looming over you, do not be afraid. Remember that I am always with you, even in those times and places, and I will comfort you through to the other side.

And when you reach the other side, I have prepared a huge meal of all of your favorite things - you will feast, and all of the pain and fear will melt away from you. Your body, your mind, your spirit will be revived.

And not just today – but every day. Every day of your life, I will be there. My heart will chase after you because I love you. And that love will be your home today, tomorrow, for all of your time on this Earth and beyond.



# DID YOU KNOW?

CENTRAL'S CORNERSTONE TIME CAPSULE... The cornerstone laid for the original 1872 building can be seen in church ground on the corner of Liberty and Union Street. In 1927, a box with church papers was placed behind the present church cornerstone under the Gethsemane window. In 1988, Central was celebrating it's 150th Anniversary, 2 men from the church crawled over a rough floor to find the time capsule. They foundd it. In 2013 as we celebrated 175 years, found it again. That year, the trustees hire outside help to bring out the capsule. In 2013 a more secure and bigger time capsule was bought. New items were added to the previousyears' materials and it was sealed. The capsule was returned to a more accessible space behind the altar and under the Gethsemane window.
