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### **PASTOR'S NOTES**



As I write this, I am sitting on a lakeshore in Alabama, at my sister's new home. She and her husband closed on it a few days before I arrived, and we've had some fun figuring out where things go and what she wants it to look like. They are making a move from a much smaller living situation, where there was no room for much in the way of furniture; they sold most of what they had when they made that move.

Consequently, they have a blank slate to work with. What freedom! They've had the opportunity to evaluate everything they own carefully. With the streamlining they did previously, everything they have now is important and precious to them; they have let go of the things that have little or no

meaning. It's an exciting prospect to be able to decide exactly what (and what not) to bring into this new living situation.

This move represents a place to host children and grandchildren, and to wake up each day to the quiet and serenity of a lake slough. Watching the moving and selection process has given me a glimpse into my sister's life and personality which I doubt I would see otherwise. Each thing is chosen with care for the purpose it will serve, not simply to add acquisitions or clutter. Each thing matters in the life she wants to have here. It reflects deep care for a core vision she has of the life they want together.

That is a lesson we can take into congregational life as well as into our own personal lives. Phyllis Tickle in The Great Emergence describes cycles of church history and reformation as being akin to large rummage sales, where we as The Church examine everything we have and everything we do, and carefully select what to weed out, prune away, or discard. It is hard work, but it is a great work, as we periodically through our history take a good hard look at how we live out our faith. Do we carry too much baggage? Too much extra weight? Are we holding on to things simply out of sentiment, and not because they are serving God and neighbor as we need to do? Are we keeping things that are centered in love and in being the faithful disciples of Christ we are called to be?

Food for thought, as I sit by the slough...



### TECH MINISTRY

Integration of the two new computers into the system is complete. We tweak and adjust them as time goes along, but they work well and do everything we hoped. They have provided several unexpected time-saving and ease-of-operation benefits as well.

The problem with the rear projector not working with the new computers has been resolved, so the committee has decided to keep it for a while longer and instead concentrate on installing a video switcher better suited to our needs. Conversations with our technical consultant in this regard are underway.

Other adjustments have consolidated wires and cables and streamlined and simplified operations. Installation of a piano monitor to facilitate piano and organ duets is complete and working well. Vocal monitors for the choir are being put back into service. These and other similar changes have improved TV Ministry's ability to support the church's worship and program life.

The Youth/Young Adult Tech Team Intern Program continues to provide consistent, capable support in the tech booth. Additional youth for that program and more adult volunteers are always welcome. Others willing to help prepare before services and followup after are needed, too. No experience is required, just an interest in and a willingness to contribute to this ministry of Central. ### CENTRAL SERVES

What can outreach look like when you have honest conversations with school administrators? What can outreach sound like? What does it feel like?

It feels like listening closely, and being open to wherever the Spirit leads the other person. Not coming in with preconceived notions about what "helping" looks like for a group or a place.

This past month, a conversation with JonMichael Shea, the Principal at CFJ Elementary School, helped Central Serves reevaluate what service to a school might look like.

When we asked him how we could be supportive, he started with upcoming events, helping students, things we would expect. Then we asked the question: if there was something we could do, right now, to support you, this school and its staff, what would it be?

#### And we listened.

It was quite simple. Principal Shea's eyes widened. "Well..." he said, "there is one thing. We had someone redo our staff break room, which is great, but the coffee machine broke and we haven't been able to afford a new one. Do you think that's something you could help with? I understand if you can't."

Well, we can. And we did. Not only did Central Serves bring them a coffee machine, we brought them two. Because God's bounty goes farther than you or I could imagine, and we wanted to show CFJ that love. We put stickers on the Keurigs to thank staff for the work they do and that we send our love from Central UMC!

We never would have imagined that coffee would be helpful, positive outreach. That God would work through Principal Shea to bravely make the school's needs known. But that small outreach makes a big difference in their lives today, and everyday that the staff of CFJ need a little pick-me-up. And now we're asking Jennie F how we can support their staff, too - because we learned, after one impactful conversation, that there are many ways to approach outreach.



### MISSIONS TEAM

Our mini-mission project for May is to create health kits for UMCOR. These kits help provide basic necessities to those who are most vulnerable during times of crisis. Health Kits are distributed during disasters, whether socio-economic or as the result of a natural occurrence. Kits consist of: one hand towel (15 x 25 - 17 x 27 inches), one washcloth, one comb (at least 6 inches of teeth), one toenail or fingernail clipper, bath-size soap (3 oz. bar or larger; no lvory or Jergen's soap), one adult toothbrush, 10 adhesive bandages (<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> by 3 inches). Materials will be collected during the month of May and we will gather together and assemble the kits. Specific list of materials can be found in the Welcome Center.


#### SACRED SITES OPEN HOUSE Sunday, May 21<sup>st</sup> 1-3pm
