

#### PASTOR MICHELLE'S NOTES



Lent and Easter have come and gone... Now what?

I think that is a very real spiritual question every year at this time—going all the way back to the disciples in those first days and weeks after Jesus was raised from death. Now what? What do we do? Where do we go? What will happen next? How do we deal with a risen Jesus?

You may have set some intentions (or not) for growth during Lent, and you may (or may not) have carried through with them. You've

participated (or not) in the retelling and reliving the story of Holy Week and celebrated (or not) the great victory of God over death. Now what?

The resurrection is not just a historical event to be remembered; it is a transformative experience. Easter invites us to embrace the reality of the risen Christ in our daily lives, knowing that this is not a once-accomplished event, but an ongoing one. Resurrection doesn't end when the lilies and the sounds of Easter music fade. Resurrection happens every time a life is transformed, every time sorrow and suffering are overturned, every time oppression is broken and justice is done, every time love wins.

Resurrection life brings with it with renewed hope, and a call to love more deeply, serve with greater compassion, and grow in our relationship with God. It brings with it the invitation to see Christ in each other, to forgive as we have been forgiven, and to extend grace and kindness intentionally, with a heart of compassion, loving as Jesus loved, selflessly and sacrificially.

So, now what?

Now we go and live the resurrection life every single day. We listen for God's voice, we wait for the Spirit to move, we love as Christ loved and give as Christ gave, and we grow more and more into the shape of the One we celebrate at Easter.

#### PASTOR PAUL'S NOTES

"In the world we live in today, I believe the light of God can bring us out of the shadows." (Angel Moreira)

A few weeks ago, Sherri and I planted seeds (indoors) for our pepper, broccoli, eggplant, and cabbage crops. The broccoli and cabbage seeds sprouted within a few days and are now getting "leggy" as they stretch for the light. Our front room has three large south-facing windows and the "seed table" is there. A few times a day, we turn each batch of seeds so that the seeds can get light equally on all sides, but they still seem to be stretching and searching for the light. The peppers and eggplant are still in the shadows of the potting soil. Are they seeking the light, too? Are they struggling to break through the shadows and reach out?

That got me to thinking, are we stretching and seeking for the Light? Our "intentional" Lent is over; Jesus is resurrected; all is well! Or is it?

Are we like our broccoli and cabbage seeds that have sprouted and growing— or are we like the peppers and eggplant, still in the dirt, covered in shadows? Waiting.

My time in Lent was spent doing some soul searching (aka hiking!), some more Bible reading and thinking, and time searching for God and finding a deeper relationship with God. Like our seedlings, though, I still am seeking that Light (I wish I was getting more "leggy" like our seedlings, though!). Some days, the shadows of life seem to creep in and I wonder where the Light is. It is hard to see the Light through the intense shadows at times! Even with the time change we all experienced in March, the days seem to be filled with shadows.

I hope that I can continue my "intentional" Lenten disciplines and continue to search and seek the Light. I hope that you continue your Lenten disciplines (or the Means of Grace for Sunday school people!!) and continue to grow and seek the Light in your life.

Like our pepper and eggplant seeds—the struggle is real and it may take a while, but seek the light.



(Update- they sprouted!!)

The United Methodist General Conference scheduled for 2020 has been delayed twice, and is now set to begin April 22, 2024. This is the legislative body in the United Methodist Church, responsible for setting church policy and revising the Book of Discipline, which outlines the laws, doctrine, and governance of the denomination. Held every four years (unless postponed by COVID!), GC is a global gathering of delegates, both clergy and lay, who are elected by their respective annual conferences. It is the only entity that speaks officially for the church, making it a vital forum for addressing theological, social, and administrative matters. GC's decisions on issues such as church doctrine, social justice, and the ordination of clergy have significant implications for the direction and unity of the denomination, making it an important event in the life of the UMC.

A GC delegate is responsible for representing their annual conference, deliberating and voting on church legislation, participating in discussions on church doctrine, policy, and social issues, and helping shape the direction of the denomination through their decisions. Pastor Michelle was elected to be a reserve delegate, but has in the last month moved into a seated delegate spot after a delegation member's resignation.

GC typically spans two weeks, with the first week dedicated to legislative committees and the second week to plenary sessions. The first week, delegates are divided into committees that focus on specific areas, such as church and society, global ministries, or finance and administration, which review and amend petitions and resolutions submitted prior to the conference. The second week consists of plenary sessions, where the entire body convenes to discuss, debate, and vote on the recommendations from the legislative committees, making final decisions on church policies, doctrines, and resolutions that will guide the denomination for the next four years.

Now you know! Pastor Michelle will keep you posted on all things GC as the month goes by.



#### Native American Ministries Sunday, April 14, 2024

This is a denomination-wide celebration designed to raise awareness and remind United Methodists of the gifts of Native Americans. We affirm the sacredness of

indigenous people, their languages, cultures, and gifts to the church and the world. Members are encouraged to donate through their local churches or give online.

- 50% of the funds collected remain in the Annual Conference to develop and strengthen Native American ministries in the conferences. To assist in developing these programs, each conference has a Committee on Native American Ministries (CONAM).
- 25% of the donations fund scholarships designated scholarships for Native Americans attending United Methodist schools of theology.
- 25% percent of the donations create beneficial programs, including mentoring programs, peer support systems, funding for economic development projects, and restoring traditional and historic ways that raise new leaders for Native American communities.

#### PERSONAL CARE ITEMS – UE SCHOOLS

Our April mini-mission project will be collecting hygiene items for the UE schools. Over the last few weeks, we have received emails from the UE school community resource people asking about personal care items. This seems to be an ongoing struggle for many of community families. One resource person recently commented "...it's getting to be the time of year when the smells seem to be coming out and we definitely have students in need that don't have the proper home structure to support them." Needs include (but are not limited to): deodorant, dry shampoo, body spray, full body deodorant, mouthwash, wet wipes. Additionally, socks and potentially antifungal foot sprays (often the feet seem to be the problem) would be welcomed.


